The Index

When dealing with parents who have a child(ren) with an additional need. If they are not already aware of it, please inform them of 'the index' (of children and young people with disabilities or additional needs). More information about the index and how to register can be found here.

When parents register with the index we currently provide them with a <u>Max Card</u> as a thank you. We are now coming to the end of the supply of Max Cards and we will not be getting any more. As they provide discounts to attractions and some restaurants (both locally and nationally), we do on occasions get requests for Max Cards from parents who have not, or are not, eligible to sign up to the index (e.g. they do not live in Cardiff or do not have a child with an additional need).



Childcare Offer



Definitions of Childcare


Type of Childcare	What do they do	Ages they cater for	Registered with Care Inspectorate for Wales
Childminders	Childminders are childcare providers working in their own homes who may offer full and part time care, including before and after school, wrap around provision, (childcare that schools provide outside of normal school hours, such as breakfast clubs or after school) holiday, evening, overnight or weekend care.	0 to 12	Yes
Full Daycare / Day nurseries:	Day nurseries provide childcare for young children from birth to age 5. They usually open from early morning to early evening, Monday to Friday, all year round. They offer a caring, safe, stimulating environment either as full day care or part-time care for babies and pre-school children. Some	0 - 5	Yes




Dlaygroung/Cylchoodd Maithrin	may also provide care before and after school and in the holidays for older children too.	2½ - 5	Yes
Playgroups/Cylchoedd Meithrin:	Playgroups cater mainly for children aged 2½ to 5 years, usually for 2 to 3 hours in the morning or afternoon and mainly during term time. Cylchoedd Meithrin are Welshmedium playgroups which give children an opportunity to become bilingual (in English and Welsh).	2/2 - 5	Yes
Out of school childcare clubs	Out of school childcare clubs help parents or carers who work or attend training. They include breakfast clubs, after school clubs, holiday play schemes and wrap around daycare for school aged children.	3 - 12	Yes (if operating for more than two hours)
Open access play schemes	Open access playschemes are places where children are free to come and go. They must be registered with Care Inspectorate for Wales if they cater for children under 8 for more than 2 hours a day.	5 - 14	Yes (located at 3 play centres in Cardiff)
Crèche	Occasional day care for children aged from birth up to the age of 12 years on non-domestic premises.	0 - 12	In some cases, but not always.




	They need to be registered where they run for more than two hours a day and more than five days a year, even where individual children attend for shorter periods. Some are in permanent premises and care for children while parents are engaged in particular activities (e.g. training, shopping or sport). Others are established on a temporary basis to care for children while their parents are involved in time-limited activities (e.g. a conference or an exhibition).		
Part-time education for children aged 3 and 4 year olds (Foundation Phase)	Children are entitled to a part-time nursery place from the start of the term after they have turned 3. In Cardiff, this is 12.5 hours a week at a recognised nursery education provider, details of which can be found on page 52 of the Admissions to School 2019/20 book. Children will stay in nursery school until the September after their fourth birthday when they start reception class in primary school.	3 - 4	The Admissions to School 2019/20 book can be found here, which includes details of the Foundation Phase, admissions processes and school application dates.
